On behalf of the Foundation, I had the pleasure of presenting a cheque for \$215,000 to the hospital which was gratefully received by MBPH board member Quinton Norton and CEO Terry Welch.

This money will assist with the cost of establishing the Clinical Trials and Research Unit.

The Unit will provide a valuable additional service for the health care of the community and further adds to the services provided at MBPH, which CEO Terry Welch, described as a "game changer" for health in the Northern Mallee region.

The MBPH Foundation is grateful for the great generosity of our many wonderful sponsors and advertisers, without whose support, the publication of this magazine would not have been possible and we thank them for their valuable contribution.

I hope you enjoy reading Heartbeat as much as we enjoyed producing the publication.

Sarah's

STORY OF SURVIVAL

WHEN 18-year-old Sarah Young was admitted to Mildura Base Public Hospital's (MBPH) ICU, she was struggling to breathe and needed to be put on ventilator. Such is the severity of this year's Influenza strain.

A patient presenting with Sarah's life-theatening symptoms, would normally be transferred to Melbourne by air, but in her case the situation was so critical, that it would have been dangerous to move her from the MBPH ICU.

MBPH Intensive Care Specialist, Dr Michael Patterson, who was looking after Sarah from her time of admission said she remained on a ventilator for eight days.

"Sarah's increasingly deteriorating condition saw her almost needing to be connected to a heart-lung, by-pass machine," Dr Patterson said.

"However, with the remote assistance of the Alfred Hospital, this was fortunately avoided."

Sarah's uncle, Aboriginal Heath Liaison Officer, Jamie Billing, said that Sarah was admitted by ambulance and immediately had a tube inserted to help her breath.

"She had that for a while, and slowly her condition started to improve and then the physios got involved and taught her some exercises and even with her issues, Sarah really worked hard at that," Jamie said.

"Compared to how she was 13 days ago it's an amazing turn around!"

Sarah thanked all of the ICU team and everyone at the MBPH who had cared for her.

"Everyone has been so caring and I am lucky to be back to good health and it's all thanks to their great work," she said.

MBPH Executive Director for Patient Experience Andrea Floyd said Sarah's experience and outcome was the hospital at its best.

"This is great example of collaboration between the nursing and the medical staff and the Alfred, in the care of Sarah from the beginning," Andrea said.

"It has really been exceptional. I think Jamie will have told you that they were looking at doing a procedure called ECMO, which is for the sickest of sick patients.

(The ECMO procedure, which pumps blood outside of the body to a heart-lung machine that removes carbon dioxide and sends oxygen-filled blood back to tissues in the body.)

"Sarah was so sick that we couldn't even contemplate road travel to Melbourne.

"I think we did an exceptional job looking after her and I think it is testament to Sarah's strength as well – she is an amazing girl."

Fortunately, Sarah made a full-recovery thanks to the wonderful expert treatment she received from the team in the MBPH ICU, which is renowned for it's brilliant lifesaving work.

Dr Patterson said that Sarah's case is an example of how the flu can severely affect people of all ages - even the very young.

The message - get yourself vaccinated!

FLU FACTS:

During 2023, amidst the fourth year of the COVID-19 pandemic in Australia, continued seasonal influenza activity is anticipated as borders remain open and interstate and international travel increases.

People who are planning international travel should ensure they have had a 2023 influenza vaccination before departure. Depending on individual circumstances, a northern hemisphere influenza vaccine administered overseas should be considered for optimal protection while travelling.

Annual vaccination should ideally occur before the onset of each influenza season. The period of peak influenza circulation is typically June to September in most parts of Australia. In 2022, as international travel resumed, Australia observed a resurgence of influenza with an early season commencement.

During 2023, influenza epidemiology may be atypical, particularly in the context of COVID-19. Vaccination is the most important measure to prevent influenza and its complications.

While protection is generally expected to last throughout the year, the highest level of protection occurs in the first 3 to 4 months after vaccination.

REMARKABLE TALE OF SURVIVAL

A HIGHLY emotional reunion took place at Mildura Base Public Hospital on February 15, this year, when 19-year-old Caleb Bowers was reunited with the team who saved his life.

Caleb returned to the hospital with his mother Karen to meet the team who saved his life last year after he suffered a traumatic head injury when struck by a car when crossing Deakin Avenue.

Tears flowed freely as ICU Nurse Unit Manager Andrea Bock and Dr Michael Patterson recounted the events of the day.

The then 18 -year-old apprentice chef suffered a traumatic head injury when struck by a car when crossing Deakin Avenue on April 28 last year and was brought to the hospital's emergency department in a critical condition.

A neurosurgeon was deployed from Melbourne, and was due to arrive in three hours, but Caleb's condition was deteriorating fast.

Dr Michael Patterson and a supporting nursing team needed to act.

Fighting back tears, Caleb's mum Karen said he wouldn't be standing here today without their actions.

"Words can't describe how grateful I am," she said.

"Just talking to the surgeons in Melbourne, they said what the guys did here - he wouldn't be standing here now if he wasn't taken to ICU straightaway, if they didn't fly a surgeon here to operate before taking him in there."

Caleb had to be resuscitated that day, before being put on

a ventilator and given anaesthetic as he was ushered to intensive care.

"Thankfully Michael happened to be on duty and proceeded to get him pushed through to ICU very quickly," ICU nurse unit manager Andrea Bock recalled.

"What he did that day was nothing short of amazing."

Caleb was transferred to an operating theatre the moment the neurosurgeon arrived.

Bone was meticulously removed from Caleb's skull to relieve swelling on his brain, and once surgery was complete, he was whisked away to the Alfred Hospital for recovery.

Dr Patterson said without the procedures the base hospital had in place, Caleb's fate would have been very different.

"I don't think he would have survived," Dr Patterson said.

"Every day we're liaising with The Alfred, we have telehealth with them and the retrieval service every day to try to make sure that we've got the capabilities here to provide intensive care so that when something like this happens, we're ready to go," he said.

Caleb spent a few weeks recovering at the Alfred, before several more at the Epworth Hospital for his rehabilitation.

He was determined to return home quickly, and had plenty of motivation to overcome the barriers he faced.

"Mainly Mum and that just trying to push me through, and friends that were worried about me, just wanting to get to work as well, do stuff that I enjoy," Caleb said.

His projected hospital stay was at least six months, but less than two months after the incident he was back home with his family.

"He wanted to be home by his 19th birthday, and he was home two weeks before," Karen said.

Caleb has continued his rehabilitation, and had his final exercise physiology appointment at Lime Therapy this week.

He has also returned to work at Brother Chris on a parttime basis - setting himself some short-term goals as he continues to recover.

"Just regaining my strength to what it used to be, remembering all the things that happened at work, not requiring any help from anyone, trying to get used to relying on my-self," Caleb said.

As a result of the incident, Caleb does have a slightly impaired sense of smell.

A dietitian at the Epworth Hospital is in the process of writing a cookbook for people with an olfactory impairment, and Caleb will be one of the first people to review it.

"Being an apprentice chef, they've sent us a copy, he's cooked a couple of recipes and he's got to send them some feedback for them soon," Karen said.

MBPH CEO Terry Welch said that Caleb's story was a wonderful example of the MBPH at its best.

"We talk all the time about our values and our team-based focus, but hearing the tales from that day just highlighted to me what an incredible team of people we have working at MBPH," Terry said.

"The situation they faced when Caleb arrived at the hospital's emergency department was daunting to say the least and just listening to Dr Patterson and Andrea talk about what they did to save this young man's life was simply amazing."

This is not an isolated story. On many occasions we have seen different teams step up to ensure positive outcomes for our patients.

"It just makes me so proud to be working with every single one of our 1200 staff who I know come to work wanting to make a difference. Well done, you should all feel very proud to be part of the MBPH team," Terry added.

Appreciation Day is a chance to celebrate the contribution of all our non-clinical staff and it again highlights our teambase value which contributes to the success of our service.


Our MBPH values are continuing to drive our success and the role they play in supporting every team member through the highs and lows of working in such a complex environment should not be under-valued.

The gift of life

THAT SADLY COMES THROUGH DEATH

ORGAN, eye and tissue donation saves lives, restores health and improves the quality of life for thousands of Australians each year.

However, the fact is, only two per cent of people who die in hospital each year, can be considered for organ donation? One organ donor can save the lives of up to seven people and help many more through eye and tissue donation.

In February this year, a 49-year-old Vietnamese woman was in Mildura holidaying with her sister, when she became unwell and then suffered a cardiac arrest, which rendered her unconscious and unable to breathe.

By the time ambulance paramedics were able to render assistance and revive her and get a pulse, her brain had been starved of blood supply for a significant period of time.

The lady was stabilised in the Mildura Base Public Hospital's (MBPH) Emergency Department and then placed in the care of the Intensive Care Unit (ICU) team, but despite everyone's best efforts, the patient's brain began to swell and she was eventually declared brain dead.

Intensive Care Specialist, Dr Michael Patterson, treated the patient upon her arrival into ICU and said while it was a very unfortunate set of circumstances, there was to be a silverlining outcome.

"The patient was placed on a ventilator and we were able to stabilise her for a period and monitor her blood pressure levels and brain activity," Dr Patterson said.

"You never really know how things are going to go, but her heart had stopped for quite a while, and so it was unlikely she was going to do very well.

"When your heart is stopped for that long, you can get

quite a lot of brain swelling and that is unfortunately what happened to this lady.

"Her brain became very swollen due to that lack of blood supply and she became brain dead."

Because the woman's family were in Vietnam, and didn't speak English, communicating to them what had happened, was challenging.

Once aware of the situation, her husband made arrangements to fly to Australia and was able to be with his wife at her bedside to say goodbye before the decision to switch off her life-support was made.

Following this, the family were asked if they would consider allowing their loved one's organs to be donated, something they would subsequently consent to.

DonateLife's organ retrieval team in Melbourne was alerted to the news that there was an organ donor at the MBPH. Once it was determined what organs were compatible for transplant to a recipient - which takes some days - Donate Life despatched their surgeons to Mildura who were then assisted in theatre by MBPH clinicians to undertake the procedure which took several hours.

The DonateLife team were able to retrieve the woman's lungs, liver and both of her kidneys.

If there is such a thing as a silver lining to a story like this, it would be in regard to the fact that three organ transplant recipients will have had their lives extended and in the case of the kidney recipient, the need to be on constant dialysis, is now a thing of the past.

MBPH Executive Director – Clinical Operations, Katrina Allen paid tribute to all of the MBPH clinician s who looked after

the patient and in particular, the staff who assisted the organ retrieval team.

"The MBPH theatre staff who assisted the DonateLife surgeons volunteered for the role, which was performed on a weekend, outside of their normal rostered hours and they deserve to be congratulated for their dedication," Katrina said.

The Vietnamese lady was in the MBPH for seven days before she was then conveyed to the funeral home prior to her cremation at the Coomealla Crematorium, where a service was held for her.

The MBPH approached Sunraysia Funeral's owner Elvira lamarino to assist with the cremation service and upon hearing the circumstances of the case, she kindly waived her service fees and only charged for the costs associated with the cremation and death certificate.

"I was very moved by the situation that was explained to me by the hospital and was very happy to assist the deceased's husband with the service, which had to be conducted under very sad circumstances," Mrs lamarino said.

Katrina Allen said that the hospital greatly appreciated the assistance that Elvira and Sunraysia Funerals provided.

"It was a generous and compassionate gesture for which the deceased's family were also very grateful for too," she said.

Following the cremation the deceased's husband returned to Vietnam with his wife's ashes. Sadly her son wasn't able to obtain a visa to enter Australia in time for his mother's service, which further added to the sadness of a very unfortunate situation.







How does donation work?

The donation and transplantation of organs and tissues involves donors, families and specialist medical and nursing teams.

Donation and families: what you can do?

The two vital things you can do is to register and tell your family. Register to be a donor. Registering is important because it lets your family and the doctors and nurses know that you want to be a donor. It's easy to register and only takes a minute. You need to be over 16. Visit: www.donatelife.gov.au/register-donor-today

Tell your family. It's vital that your loved ones know you want to be a donor. This will help them make the decision when the time comes.

How organ and tissue are donated

The way you die affects the donation process and which organs and tissues can be donated.

To be an organ donor you need to die in a hospital, usually on a ventilator in Intensive Care, as your organs needs to be working well to be transplanted.

Eye and tissue donation can occur up to 24 hours after your death, so you do not need to die in a hospital.

Organ donation will only proceed if there is a person on the waitlist for an organ that is a match with you.

During end-of-life care, the medical team and donation specialists will discuss the options with your family. Care, dignity and respect are always maintained.

Donation specialist staff will keep in contact with your family over the coming months and provide support and information.

Who will be helped by my donation?

Organ and tissue donation can save and transform the lives of people who, in many cases, are seriously ill or dying.



FOUNDATION DONATES \$215,000

RESEARCH is such a fundamental part of a health care service, but it has not been something the Mildura Base Public Hospital (MBPH) has had the capacity to undertake. However, thanks to a \$215,000 cash injection from the MBPH Foundation all that has now changed with the opening of our new Clinical Trials and Research Unit.

The Mildura Base Public Hospital (MBPH) officially opened its new Clinical Trials and Research Unit on Thursday, February 2, 2023. The facility is located on the ground floor of the Specialist Clinic adjacent to the hospital.

Therapeutic Goods Administration, Chief Medical Advisor and former Head of School at Monash Rural Health, Professor Robyn Langham, who has been instrumental in the establishment of the Clinical Trials and Research Unit at the MBPH was the special guest speaker at the opening event, where MBPH Foundation Committee Chair, Ross Lake, presented a cheque for \$215,000 from the Foundation to assist with the cost of the facility.

The acquisition of this valuable funding is due to the generosity of our wonderful Foundation Partners, the list of whom, is growing daily and the broader Northern Mallee Community. Without this support, the dream of a Clinical Trials and Research Unit being established at the MBPH, would not have become a reality.

The outlook for people with many cancers is changing dramatically.

The reason is that cancer treatments are changing.

Therefore the establishment of the Clinical Trials and Research Unit provides a valuable additional service for the health care of the Mallee community and adds greatly to the services provided at MBPH which CEO, Terry Welch, described as a "game changer" for health in the Northern Mallee region.

Mr Welch said that having a local research and clinical trials unit means that people in our region can access the benefits of research and clinical trials participation without having to travel to a metropolitan trial's unit. "I am delighted that patients will now have access to new and potentially lifesaving treatments not otherwise available, with close support to their families and medical care," he said.

Importantly, MBPH will have control over which research and trials they participate in and can determine the areas of priority the hospital considers will be of most benefit.

Because of the high standards required, clinical trials participation increases the organisation's reputational status, with the community, with industry peers and with clinicians. The capacity to participate in research is an important factor considered by doctors when taking on a new position.

The MBPH CTU will also benefit from the Alfred Health TrialHub which is a partnership initiative between Alfred Health and rural and regional health services to expand participation in clinical trials.

The TrialHub is funding additional program staff, providing workforce development, training and mentoring to build MBPH's expertise in clinical trials.

Director Clinical Learning & Development, Timothy De Boo, said that during COVID the hospital was unable to conduct


information days for students interested in making a career in nursing and midwifery.

Hilltop a blueprint

FOR MBPH FOUNDATION HOUSE

MILDURA Base Public Hospital (MBPH) CEO, Terry Welch, PICTURED, visited Albury in mid-April, where he enjoyed a guided tour of 'Hilltop', which was hosted by Alice Glachan, the Accommodation Centre's Capital Fundraising Campaign Director. Mr Welch was joined on the tour by Albury Wodonga Heath CEO, Bill Appleby.

Fight Cancer Foundation and the local community through the service clubs are the owners of Hilltop, which is located on the original Albury Base Hospital's block of land, which Fight Cancer now owns and they operate the facility independently of the hospital.

Hilltop is a magnificent four-star accommodation facility which provided Mr Welch with a myriad of great ideas for MBPH Foundation House.

"To see this wonderful accommodation facilty first-hand is just amazing," Mr Welch said.

"MBPH Foundation will this year embark on a major fundraising campaign to build our Foundation House – a

home away from home for patients and their loved ones to stay and Hilltop provides an excellent blueprint for us to emulate."

The facility is located just over 50 metres via a wheelchair friendly path to the Albury Base Hospital and the Albury Wodonga Cancer Centre.


The Hilltop project was the initiative of the local Lions, Rotary and Zonta clubs, who initially raised \$1million and then they approached the Fight Cancer Foundation to partner with them to build the accommodation facility.

Those service organisations have a contract that says that they have a legal right to the ownership of the building. If for any reason Fight Cancer withdrew from the facility they would become the legal custodians.

STAGE 1 was opened in 2010 - originally 20 rooms

STAGE 2 opened just over a year ago and Hilltop is now able to sleep 60 people in 30 rooms.













STAGE 3 which will be added to the existing building and will provide an additional 10 rooms

The funding of the facility is quite unique with individuals, service organisations and businesses purchasing rooms in perpetuity for \$25,000 each in Stage 1 and \$35,000 in Stage 2. Other opportunities to donate include paying for the cost of furniture for a room and recreational amenities or the kitchen, laundry, disabled toilets and so on. More than \$3.5million has been raised.

MBPH Foundation House project will follow the same funding model in addition to our major fundraising efforts.

The suites include kitchen, dining facilities, and ensuite bathrooms. The rooms are fully equipped with quality appliances, comfortable furniture and bedding. There are also rooms available for guests requiring wheelchair access.

Each floor features a friendly communal area called 'The Hub'. The Hub boasts a comfortable lounge area with television and stereo, a fully equipped kitchen and a dining area where you can enjoy a quiet meal or mix and mingle with other guests.

To complete your home away from home at Hilltop, The Hub also features a large undercover balcony with outdoor lounge and dining furniture, and BBQ facilities.

All suites have individually controlled reverse cycle airconditioning and every room has a balcony with a beautiful view.

Attended by 180 people, guests enjoyed a sumptuous, three course menu provided by 400 Gradi and Stefano's 27 Deakin Café, while seated under the vines along the pavement in front of both restaurants.

An integral part of MBPH Foundation, The KC Society was established in honour of Mildura Surgeon Kevin Chambers to help assist rural doctors to realise their dream of practicing medicine and advance them in their training. The KC Society will ensure that the late Mr Chambers will be forever enshrined in Mildura's memory.

Mr Chambers arrived in Mildura in 1983 after completing his training at the Royal Prince Alfred Hospital in Sydney.

"He was incredibly proud of Mildura and this region having moved here 40 years ago at the age of 35.


"He was a great marketer. Extolling the virtues of Mildura,



describing it as a seething metropolis – a glittering oasis at the end of a long road from anywhere and a place with never ending sunshine – more than the so-called Sunshine and Gold Coasts!

"And he also talked about what we produce and access here. Food, wine, generous hospitality, nature, music, the arts and culture.

"Kev was tirelessly dedicated to bringing young doctors here to experience the lifestyle and the opportunities the bush had to offer. He was thrilled that they could get their hands on the tools early truly learning the craft of surgery which he loved so much.

"If those doctors and their families bought a house here that was the test - he knew they were in it for the long haul.

"Because for regional towns to thrive, access to reliable, excellent local health care is essential.

"And that meant excellent people and excellent facilities. And so we think in the end, Kev would have been happy that this lunch might be a legacy for that effort, a focus on bringing great talent here, so that Mildura can continue to grow and thrive.

"For Kev felt there was no better place on the planet than this place and he believed it deserved excellence.

Special Guest Speaker at the event, was Professor Mark Fitzgerald, Director of Trauma Services at the Alfred Hospital in Melbourne.

Prof. Fitzgerald's visit coincided with the announcement of a partnership with The Alfred Hospital and the National Trauma Research Institute which will change MBPH's care for emergency patients.

Mildura's remoteness means that the hospital is often left on its own to deal with incredibly complex situations, but using new trial technology and with the support of Prof. Fitzgerald, MBPH will be able to greatly improve patient outcomes.

While in Mildura Prof. Fitzgerald visited the MBPH and he was able to see first-hand some of the challenges the hospital faces and like us he is incredibly excited about this research program.

"Most people who die from serious injury die within the first six hours of them being injured, an hour is already gone by the time they get to hospital," Prof. Fitzgerald said.

"If the Mildura doctors and nurses can't save them that's itit's pointless trying to transfer them anywhere."

Speaking about his visit to the hospital, Prof. Fitzgerald said he hadn't been to the MBPH since well before the pandemic.

"It's three or four years ago that I was last here and the first thing I noticed, is that the place has a lot of energy," he said.

"Compared to when I was here last, everybody looks upbeat, keen and enthusiastic and the ED is well staffed.

"It's about a third of the size it needs to be to look after the case-loads that come in, but the staff manage pretty well. "I understand that hospital is looking at expanding the Emergency Department."

Exciting times

IN ALLIED HEALTH

MILDURA Base Public Hospital (MBPH) Allied Health and the Community Services teams are currently undergoing a major transition to the Royal College of Practitioners (RCP) – electronic medical records for outpatient's system

MBPH is now seeing the revival of a number of Allied Health services that were forced to be abandoned during COVID.

COVID basically destroyed a lot of the outpatient clinics because people were unable to come into the hospital – and that area was not prioritised as key essential during the peak COVID time.

There has been a lot of work done by clinicians to build up those services again.

Hydrotherapy is one key example of a service that hasn't been used in more than two years and will open up again soon.

Heartbeat recently visited the Allied Health and Community Services gymnasium, where outpatients attend rehabilitation therapy sessions on a weekly basis.

These services have only recently resumed after being closed down for more than two years due to COVID which meant outpatients could access the vital therapies needed to make a full recovery.

Many of those patients requiring 'recovery' therapies are typically stoke or heart attack victims and also hip and knee replacement recipients.

The MBPH therapists who supervise the sessions are a group of dedicated, MBPH team members who provide expert treatment and advice to their patients in a caring and professional manner.

One such clinician, is MBPH Oncology Service, Kimberlee Howe, who leads a prostate cancer exercise group, that is exclusively for patients with prostate cancer who are currently undergoing active treatment.

"The group meets in the hospital gymnasium and the exercises aim to help patients gain more strength and

to enhance their bone density better health in general," Kimberlee said.

"Now that the service has resumed, we are getting a lot of positive feedback from those attending the sessions.

"There is also a social aspect to the group sessions whereby patients get to meet other men who are going through the same thing they are and so it gives moral support as well as being a lot of fun and the guys really enjoy it."

There are three types of prostate cancer an oncologist has to deal with, which Kimberlee said the best way of explaining them in layman's terms, is to think of the oncologist as a farmer.

"You have a patient whose cancer is like a turtle," she said.

"It's slow and isn't going to go anywhere and they don't have to worry about it for the whole of their life and it's not going to bother them.

"Then there is the hare. The farmer uses a fence to keep the hare in and it stays within the boundaries of the prostate. You don't have to worry about it spreading, but you do have to have the radiation and hormone therapy to keep it contained.

"And then there is the third kind, which is a bird, who will fly free, and this is the worst one to have, because it can go anywhere in the body."

Kimberlee said that her section is in the process of establishing a 'Managing Cancer Program' run by Cancer Council Victoria."

"It is vital for there to be strong messaging around the importance for men to get their prostate checked by their doctor - something many men neglect to do," she said.

"We also want to stress the importance of exercise for men who have cancer, because a lot of them don't understand that

"Typically, we have a lot of farmers who have worked hard all

their lives and they don't go and see a doctor.

"And if you do get diagnosed with prostate cancer, you have to go and see so many people.

"You're not just seeing your doctor. You are seeing the oncologists, a radiation oncologist, a urologist – it is overwhelming the number of people you have to see and so many don't want to have to meet with an Exercise Physiologist as well."

A TALE OF GRIT AND DETERMINATION

Kimberlee spoke of a regularly attending patient, who wanted to be able to walk the whole distance in this year's Anzac Day march and so he put in a concerted effort to get fitter.

"He's a National Service Veteran and he didn't think he would be able to walk in the Anzac Day march and that was upsetting him," Kimberlee said.

"But, by attending some exercise sessions, he got his confidence back by walking on the treadmill and building up the strength in his legs and he was able to complete the march. He was in tears when he told me – which is absolutely amazing!"

Kimberlee was talking about Former National Serviceman, Russell Pearson 78.

"I attend the gymnasium every Thursday for an hour to do some physiotherapy training," Russell said.

"I have had my prostate and my bladder removed and I need to get a little fitter.

"I took part in the Anzac Day march, and last year and really struggled to go the distance.

"This year, I was determined that I was going to make it and with Kim's help with the physio, she got me there! This program has really helped me – it is really, really good."

Kimberlee said that the Gymnasium at the hospital is very well equipped,

"We have been fortunate to install a lot of new equipment in the gym, including treadmills, cross trainers, rowing machines and exercise bikes and we are in the process of getting cable machine because some of these guys can lift 20 kilos and we shouldn't be undersubscribing exercise, we need it to be to a maximum quality level," she said.

The fact is, the cancer itself reduces a person's physical stamina and in the case of prostate cancer, the hormone therapy reduces the testosterone levels in the body and that leads to the patient losing a lot of muscle mass and they also put on weight and often can't control their emotions as much and they can also suffer from hot flushes – there are a lot of side effects they have to endure, but it is necessary if they are going to survive and recover."

Another gentleman attending the exercise session when Heartbeat was visiting, was Michael Wood, who described the treatment and therapy he receives at the MBPH as excellent.

"It is very good – excellent – and it is helping me recover from the stroke I had at Christmas time and I also had some heart surgery at the end of March," Michael said.

"I'm getting there. It's been a slow process but I'll will get there - they're fantastic here!"

A RANGE OF THERAPISTS

MBPH Exercise Physiologist, Alistair Mumford, said outpatients attending the clinic will typically need to see the Exercise Physiologist, the Physio Therapists and also the Occupational Therapists.

"Stoke victims in particular will need to attend the sessions to regain the deficit in the upper limb that they need to recover," he said.

"These patients will have a series of individualised exercises to benefit the upper limb.

"We also concentrate on balance and strength during the classes as well in all we aim to cover all of the bases required for a full recovery."

The obvious point has to be made that during COVID, there rehabilitation therapies weren't able to be accessed and so stroke and heart attack survivors largely went without the treatment they so desperately needed.

"They suffered enormously from this deprivation," Alistair said

"There was a lack of opportunity to recover. While they were an inpatient they were able to receive it on the wards, but not as an outpatient."

Alistair said that now the clinic's services have resumed, they can have up to eight people at any one time in the gymnasium area and usually have five or six active participants at one time.

"Generally, they will attend the sessions over an eight week



block and then after that we access what they may need ongoing to make the best recovery they can," he said.

"Those services will be beyond outpatients and may be provided by a community or private facility or sometimes people just prefer to do it in the privacy of their own home and we can provide them with guidance in that instance.

"Another service we provide, is we can bring patients off the rehabilitation or the acute ward to the Neuro Group as long as they are medically stable enough to do that.

"And so, we currently bringing patients off the ward who have had a stroke or a neurological episode and they can start to participate in therapies as they transition to becoming an outpatient."

Alistair said that in the case of a stroke patient, they are seen immediately.

"The rehabilitation therapies usually commence three or four weeks later, depending on how severe the stoke has been," he said.

"But we like to get them into the group a week or two after they are discharged - so there isn't a big delay.

POST OP EXERCISES

Alistair explained that the Post Op exercises are designed for patients who have had a hip or knee replacement.

"We get referrals for them off the wards and also from the outpatient clinic physios," he said.

"The patient will come in one a week for their supervised

exercises and they can that for up to eight weeks.

"We also provide them with 'homework' - exercise programs they can do at home - and again we have about eight people in the group.

"These exercises focus on strength and returning them to be able to undertake functional tasks and to improve the range of motion, especially for knees - getting them to bend to have a range of functionality so they can return to doing the things they did before the operation and hopefully have a better quality of life after the surgery."

Alistair highlighted the fact that the stages to recovery vary from patient to patient.

"No two surgeries are the same. Hips and knees are always individualised outcomes," he said.

"Having said that we do have a pretty good success rate at the MBPH, but there are challenges, particularly in the early phase of post-operative recovery.

"We see people sometimes a week to two weeks after the operation, which is still very early and they will be dealing with a lot of post-op pain and swelling.

"And so, to get them moving through that is superimportant, but also quite challenging.

"When we access them at the end of the eight weeks, we can see where they have improved from where they started, which is comforting to the patient and hopefully gives them the encouragement to keep going."





From India

TO MILDURA VIA NEW ZEALAND

ORIGINALLY from Keralla, in southern India, Registered Nurse, Merin George recently joined the clinical staff at the MBPH after she decided to leave Auckland in New Zealand to come to Australia and found herself working at the Base.

"I was interested in coming to Australia because I have relatives here and they said it is a good place to live and work – it has a nice climate and the salary rates are good," Merin said.

"I then enquired more about Mildura. I had friends who had worked at the hospital here who told me it was a good place to work and Mildura's a nice place to live.

"I then applied and was fortunate to be granted an interview and my application was successful.

"The MBPH then assisted us with the relocation from New Zealand including helping with the visa application and other administrative things which was really excellent and made it very easy to come here.

"When you are new to Australia it is really hard to do the paper work and the relocating process is complicated."

Merin said she was very grateful to Julie Pettett (Employee Relocation and Wellness Liaison Officer) for her assistance.

"She was really helpful and on our first day she met with us and it was a really nice welcome to Mildura and the hospital," she said.

"Julie also did a wonderful job assisting us to find housing here because we don't have any references and so most of the property managers won't take you as a tenant. "Julie came with us and had a chat with them and with her support it really helped us to find a place to live."

Merin became a recruiting officer herself encouraging another Indian friend and nursing colleague Surya Kochu, with whom she worked in New Zealand, to come to Mildura too.

"We both moved together to Mildura with our families and so it was a lovely situation to be both in a new town and hospital together which also made the move easier," Surya said

"I enjoy working in the critical care areas of the hospital and in New Zealand I was working in aged care which is quite different.

"It has been easier to transition to my role here at the MBPH because the staff are so helpful and we can always consult a senior person they are always very helpful.

"I also like the fact that there are so many other nationalities working here it is a wonderful happy place and I like the team work and everyone helps each other."

Also from Keralla, Heartbeat also spoke to Merin's friend and work colleague, Surya, who explained how she too had decided to come to work at MBPH, bringing with her more than eight years of experience in ICU and theatre, gained in India and New Zealand.

"I was given an opportunity to work in New Zealand and I worked in aged care for almost 18 months, but it was always my ambition to work in Australia – it was my dream actually," Surya said.

"I spent time searching on SEEK for nursing opportunities

in Australia and I saw that there were vacancies at the Mildura Base Public Hospital, particularly in the Emergency Department.

"Given I had experience in critical care, I applied for the position and had an interview with Emma – which was a nice experience- and I was ultimately successful and got the job and commenced at the hospital in January this year.

"I also had another friend who had worked at the MBPH previously and she told me a wonderfully, friendly place to it was to work at.

"She said that for new comers to Australia, Mildura is a nice place to come to.

"I then asked another friend, who is still working in the Paediatric Ward at MBPH, about the management and she said it was a really nice place and so that's how I chose Mildura."

Surya is with her family in Mildura and she said that Merin and her husband knew each other in India and worked together and that is how we all became friends and we lived together in New Zealand and now are all in Mildura and it is nice to know people here when you first arrive.

Surya also paid tribute to the MBPH staff who were very helpful in making the transition to Australia a smooth process and upon arrival the educative induction program which was very informative and welcoming.

"The Julie was very helpful and arranged our temporary accommodation and then introduced us to a real estate agent who found a home for us to rent-which was very nice," Surya said.

WITH the recruitment of new nurses at the MBPH being a great success, with that comes the need for intensive training for those completing Registered Nurse courses.

Regular training session are held at the hospital where real-life Emergency Department and in-theward simulations and practical workshops are regularly conducted.

Sustainability

AT THE HEART OF MBPH

ENVIRONMENTAL responsibility and sustainability are at the heart of Mildura Base Public Hospital's (MBPH) mission to reduce the organisation's carbon footprint and to recycle and reduce single use plastic items where practicable.

To achieve this, MBPH has introduced a number of sustainability initiatives and programs throughout the hospital.

These include, the implementation of a fleet of hybrid vehicles, installing solar panels, using eco-friendly recycled paper for printers, phasing out of single use plastic items and coffee cups and the recycling of blue towels used in the surgical unit and so much more.

MBPH Café Manager, Chantelle Robins is enthusiastically embracing the changes to how the café operates and how it will play an important role in the hospital's goal to achieve a high-level of sustainability across the organisation. "Sustainability is something that I'm learning more about and it's becoming a passion of mine," Chantelle said.

"We are introducing 'keep cups' that we will possibly give

out to staff or they will be available at a low price. "And they will be branded keep cups as well, to show how important it is to us."

Incredibly, but perhaps not surprising, the hospital cafe use close to 1000 cups a week, approaching 52000 in the course of a year

"The cups have a bio-plastic lining on the inside, meaning they are more compostable than standard plastic cups but cannot be recycled, the cups go to landfill, so that's something that we want to reduce this year and we've also stopped all single use plastic by then as well," Chantelle said.

"At the moment we are using bamboo knives and forks and spoons and we try to avoid saucers being single use.

"We are looking at heading towards reusable cutlery instead of bamboo in an effort to reduce landfill and everything we buy in from the kitchen and elsewhere comes in reusable containers, too.

"All of our plastic milk lids go to 'Lids for Kids' which is a great organisation. They turn them into prosthetics for children."











GETTING REAL ABOUT RECYCLING

THERE has been an increase in the amount of recycling of co-mingle waste materials typically, cans, bottles glass, cardboard, plastic and other materials at MBPH and so there is a serious and concerted effort to have everyone in the hospital community do their bit and to consciously dispose of waste into the right bin

MBPH Environmental Services Manager, Lacey Hateley, whose department is responsible for waste disposal within the MBPH said there is now a large number of new bins circulating throughout the hospital.

"There are a lot of yellow bins for example out in the courtyard and we also have some smaller, individual ones in some offices," Lacey said.

"The increase in the co-mingling waste indicates that more people are actively recycling their waste in a responsible way.

"It says to me that people are really getting-on-board with the program and recycling properly, which is really good to see," she said.

"We are also working toward introducing 'green waste' by the end of this year, which will see large organisations like the hospital and supermarkets, having containers similar to the community's green waste containers and green bins.

"And we will introduce a similar system here at the MBPH, particularly in the kitchen and eventually we will have bins in the courtyard.

"There is no doubt that the interest in sustainability is strong amongst the staff here at the hospital and they are actively segregating waste and are interested to know how it will be recycled and what other uses there are for waste materials and how it will be repurposed.

"When people do the right thing, it makes a significant impact on costs and it reduces our carbon footprint and so the more people on board the better!"







LITTLE BLUE TOWELS

MBPH Executive Director Clinical Operations, Katrina Allen, explained how the recycling of surgical blue towels is giving literally thousands of them a new lease of life – repurposing them for use in the broader community.

"I guess from my perspective, I had been thinking about other ways that we can recycle, re-use and engage with the community with the products we use at MBPH, Katrina said.

"One of our programs is the recycling of blue surgical towels, that would otherwise see more than 8000 of them going into landfill each year.

"The hospital undertakes more than 100 operations a week and on average there are around 8000 towels that need recycling, so it is a huge number.

"By recycling these in an efficient and sustainable way, MBPH is not only being environmentally responsible but also providing a valuable resource for the community and supporting the Christie Centre in the process who are providing a wonderful service to us."

Originally, MBPH was approached by the 'Little Blue Towels' organisation, which was established in Echuca and they gave the hospital a 240-litre wheelie bin to put the used towels into.

The towels are made of a highly absorbent material and are similar to a tea towel in size.

They are used in the theatre for surgeons, anaesthetists, nurses and other medical clinicians who are about to undertake surgical procedures, to dry their hands with after they have done a surgical scrub. Once used, the towels are never used in the hospital again.

"At the outset, the blue towels are supplied in a pack

with the sterile surgical gowns the theatre team use," Katrina said.

"When someone does a surgical scrub, they dry their hands in a very specific way and the blue towels are ideal for this procedure.

"Up until recently, the towels were being collected by Little Blue Towels and then expertly laundered and packaged by people living with disability."

Little Blue Towels are collected from participating hospitals across Victoria and Southern NSW which also previously included MBPH.

Once laundered, they were folded and packed ready for sale, with 100% of proceeds of the sale of the recycled cotton towels going to the OTIS Foundation.

Katrina said eventually however, it became economically unviable for the organisation to pick up the towels from the MBPH and so an alternative option for the recycling had to be found.

"I had the idea that we could do this ourselves locally and that is where the Christie Centre is now playing a role in recycling the towels," she said.

"Now once the towels are cleaned, the Christie Centre is making up packs of towels which can be sold through their social enterprise stores as gifts, as well as being used across a wide range of domestic, commercial and industrial sectors for a variety of purposes."

Christie Centre Executive Officer, Florence Davidson said: "This project fits in line with the Christie Centre's social enterprises and our focus on sustainability, avoiding waste and repurposing items."

"It is anticipated that once in full swing, this project will see the Christie Centre create another ongoing employment opportunity within our community."



PVC RECYCLING

MBPH Prostate Nurse, Craig Millard, has worked diligently to have PVC recycling extended to the hospital's Renal Dialysis Unit and to the Chemotherapy Ward.

"The Dialysis Unit has two shifts a day, where up to 18 patients are treated and the saline solution which is used to purify their blood, results in a large number of PVC satchels or fluid bags being used," Craig said.

"It is really just a matter of cutting the ends off the satchels and then putting the bags into the waste bin provided in the ward.

"This is pure PVC, which goes directly to a factory in New Zealand who recycles the material."

The PVC waste from the MBPH is collected by Geelong based, Aces Medical Waste and they ship it to New Zealand.

"PVC recycling was originally undertaken with used materials for theatre and now we have expanded it to dialysis and chemo and we would like to expand it further," Craig added.

"One of the questions staff asked was what happens to the PVC waste and how is it recycled and is it made into useful products and that was important to staff. If they felt it was worth doing they would do it."

As Craig pointed out, the simple thing is that all it requires, is to dispose of the satchel into the bin which is in the ward.

"If we replicate this throughout the hospital, we can dispose of a lot of waste in a sustainable way," he said.

"In addition to the fluid bags, oxygen tubing and masks can also be recycled and the intravenous bags from the wards and theatre, which collectively represent a significant amount of PVC that can be recycled."





Some other facts about MBPH's pathway to a more sustainable workplace

Paper:

All purchased A4 paper is now 100% recycled.

Used paper will go in either the secure document destruction or the co-mingled recycling, both of which will go to reuse or recycle programs.

In January, MBPH saw a 25% increase in recycled content by weight.

Paper use has reduced within the organisation and systems such as Kesto introduced by the Finance team have contributed strongly to paperless processes, in Health Information Kofax will also significantly reduce paper use once implemented.

Vehicle Fleet:

The Fleet is being converted to hybrid vehicles, replacing all petrol cars.

20 vehicles are on order, two have been received so far.

96 g/km of CO2 emissions for hybrid compared to 166 g/km for std petrol.

Once the fleet has arrived (over next 18 months) it is estimated that MBPH's annual CO2 impact from fossil fuel will reduce from 43.4 tonnes to 26.8 tonnes.

SOLAR POWER

SOLAR Energy is a natural fit for MBPH being located in sunny Sunraysia which enjoys more than 3400 hours of sunshine annually.

Late last year, the hospital installed solar panels on its roof and on any given day it generates up to 200kWp of electricity.

The more than 300kWp Solar Panel Installation system delivers significant energy cost savings.

The System which was supplied and installed by Energis consists of 668 solar panels each capable of generating 460 watts and 336 optimisers and four inverters.

MBPH Maintenance Engineering manager Matthew Carn said that the hospital is a big energy user, the consumption can be between 400-700kw depending on time of year, with the plant and equipment needed to run the systems in the hospital requiring large amounts of electricity 24 hour a day.

"Our 310KWp system is a big one but we use a power load of energy with our chillers, hot water boilers, suction systems and more," Matthew said.

The system's performance is monitored by Energis and can also be seen online at the MBPH.

Across the month of November, December and January for example, the saving on electricity cost was in the order of \$25,000 and through the course of the year, the figure will be approaching \$100,000, an average a minimum of 10 percent per day is saved.

Not only does this provide a financial benefit to the MBPH, it is sustainable, clean, carbon neutral source of renewable energy.

Since the solar panels came online, the Co2 emissions saved as of April this year were more than



138,823.59 kg which equals the planting of 236.59 trees.

On a good day we can generate 1Mwh of power for internal use.

HOW DOES THE SYSTEM WORK?

The Solar Panels: The panels capture sunlight and convert it into DC current. Solar panels contain photovoltaic cells made of silicon and when sunlight strikes the panels, it energises the electrons in the silicon, moving them around to create direct current (DC) electricity.

The Inverter: DC electricity cannot be used by common appliances or fed into the grid - it needs to be converted into alternating current (AC) first.

A power inverter, or inverter, is an electronic device or circuitry that changes direct current (DC) to alternating current (AC), usable by standard appliances.

MBPH uses all power in house and does not add to the grid.

F-WASTF

THERE is an 'E-waste' bin located at the back of the hospital near the loading and deliveries bay.

Items that are able to be disposed of include everything from old phones, to decommissioned medical equipment.

"We also recycle batteries which are a more difficult commodity to deal with because we no longer have a local organisation that will do the collection," Lacey explained.

"Battery recycling is done by Ecobatt, who specialise in the safe collection, processing and recycling of battery products Australia wide.

"The company has invested in a state-of-the-art facility modelled on proven world-class battery recycling technology.

"I have also reached out to the Mildura Rural City Council and other facilities and I recently visited the Warrnambool Hospital to see first-hand what they are doing in this space.

"They have a Sustainability Manager, who has con-



nected me with a company that is willing to come to Mildura and collect the batteries from the MBPH, which is a great outcome.

"This represents a significant change and I didn't realise how popular that service would be in the hospital and now I get emails every day from departments wanting the container to put the batteries in."

Cleanaway Waste Management pick up a large amount of the hospital's waste, including E-waste and sharps materials and are they located nearby, at the Mildura Waste and Recycling Centre.

MBPH confidential shredding is also undertaken there at the Christie Centre's Aroundagain facility opposite the hospital.



MBPH contract delivers

X-RAY SERVICES FOR MTCHS & ROBINVALE DISTRICT HEALTH SERVICE

Mildura Base Public Hospital, Mallee Track Health and Community Service and Robinvale District Health Service are different – in size, structure and composition. They also operate in communities with innately different identities and character.

Yet, they have a shared goal of improving local health outcomes in the Northern Mallee. In 2021, they set out to find new ways to do this by establishing the Northern Mallee Integrated Partnership.

The Partnership was based on trust, and defined ground rules for working together. Clear governance arrangements were established upfront, based around a transparent Memorandum of Understanding.

Each party – no matter their size – were equal partners, with quarterly meetings held on a rotational basis between Robinvale, Mildura and Ouyen or Sea Lake. They had the autonomy to act in ways that serve their own interests, in line with community needs.

Continuous communication about opportunities were mandatory, with a "if you want in, come on board" mentality, sharing ideas and resources for mutual benefit.

These foundational arrangements enabled each health service to retain its own identity while working together as equals. It's delivered a variety of services in each community and supported better access to care.

The partnership started with joint credentialing for clinicians, enhancing clinical governance while sharing the administrative burden. A broader service level agreement followed, allowing simple shared capabilities and service, without the need for cumbersome, individual agreements.

Building on this success was an opportunity to tender for an upgrade to X-ray services. Normally, Mildura Base Public Hospital (MBPH) would do this alone, but because of the partnership, they included Robinvale District Health and Mallee Track Health and Community Services in the submission. The resulting successful tender has delivered X-Ray services in all three services, right across the Northern Mallee and will be delivered by I-MED Radiology.

Now, every tender is a shared opportunity for collaboration and MBPH CEO Terry Welch said today's

X-ray announcement proved the benefit of building strong partnerships.

"Every relationship and partnership is built on trust. We have been able to secure the return of X-Ray services to Mallee Track and Robinvale because of the Northern Mallee Integrated Partnership," Mr Welch said.

"Each of our three services are unique and play a critical role in the delivery of health care in their individual communities.

"I'm sure, moving forward we will have many more exciting joint announcements, but like anything we do together, they will be done in consultation and as part of our Northern Mallee Integrated Partnership."

Mallee Track Health and Community Services interim CEO Tracey Wilson said it had been eight years since X-ray services were available at their service.

"It is fantastic that people of this community will no longer have to travel two hours to have a basic X-ray," Mrs Wilson said.

Interim CEO of Robinvale District Health Services Greg Pullen reiterated the views of his colleagues saying the return of X-ray to Robinvale was a huge plus for the community.

"It is great to be able to deliver additional services through our Northern Mallee Integrated Partnership. Having X-ray back operating out of our facility after a five-year absence is a great benefit to our community and will mean people will no longer have to travel long distances for this service." Mr Pullen said.

Currently, the Northern Mallee Integrated Partnership is embarking on a shared clinical service plan, providing further tangible linkages across the region.

This process will unlock new shared opportunities, from specialist primary, acute, mental health and aged care services, to sustainable recruitment of regional GPs – meaning better care closer to home.

By drawing on this successful framework, built around transparency and trust, this partnership is only just getting started.

And staff and community will benefit.
